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FORWARD

Reflecting on 2023 brings to mind sentiments of pride and gratitude. Although the year began with uncertain economic conditions including three of the four largest bank failures in history, Peoples Bank of Alabama was proud to be included in the sixth annual ranking of the **Forbes 2023 America's Best Banks in Each State** list released mid-year*. We were both humbled and honored to receive the recognition.

As a community leader, the bank's focus for over 46 years is rooted in good old-fashioned community banking. We value relationships and to put it simply, we bank folks that we know in markets that we understand. The bank continues to succeed by being customer-focused, community-minded, and family-oriented as well as being committed to seeing our customers reach their financial goals and delivering above market returns for our investors.

At the end of 2023, we ranked the 11th largest bank headquartered in Alabama with total assets of \$1.27 Billion. We are uniquely positioned with all of the products and services our customers want and need, while out servicing our larger competitors.

In addition to our financial success, we also invested in the long-term growth of the bank with branch improvements and market expansion in both rural and suburban areas of our footprint. Our Lacey's Spring and Locust Fork locations underwent newly designed and constructed facilities that leverage traditional in-person banking with improved utilization of technology. We also purchased a building and finished development of a new main office in Guntersville consolidating the existing branch into the new facility.

Another milestone for the year involved expansion into Shelby County with the purchase of a retail branch in Pelham. With this purchase we consolidated our



former International Park branch in Hoover into a well-located and more traditional facility.

We continue to be well capitalized with our Tier 1 leverage ratio improving to over 10% by year end. We also maintain excellent liquidity, over \$165MM at year end, which is in excess of 13% of total assets. We have no foreclosed real estate or repossessed assets on our books; and we have a healthy loan loss reserve of \$14.5MM or 1.7% comparing favorably to our industry peers.

These results are the outcome of strategic planning that has been executed by the best group of community bankers in the state. We are all committed to working hard to serve our customers, our communities, and each other. This year's Community Report highlights a few ways our bank and our associates are impacting individuals, businesses, and our communities; and how the continued support of our shareholders truly makes a difference.



ProBilling & Funding Service (PBFS), a division of Peoples Bank of Alabama, has been helping customers with cash flow challenges and accounts receivable servicing for over a decade. When a business is growing at a rapid rate, cash flow shortages, lack of man power, space, and even time constraints can often result in growth limitations. ProBilling & Funding Service can step in to help alleviate some of those challenges.

SET Logistics, for example, opened their doors in 2017 with ten staff members. Their business began in Oneonta with a focus in freight transportation. In April of 2017, PBFS began funding their receivables providing instant cash flow so they could increase their business without the normal restriction of waiting on a customer to pay them. Instead of SET holding the receivable on their books, PBFS has the receivable on theirs. This allows SET to pay the carriers that haul the load on a timely basis insuring that the carrier will look to do more business with them in the future. PBFS also handles the administrative functions involved with the receivables by overseeing payment posting on the invoices, answering billing questions, collecting payments, etc.


In five years, SET Logistics has grown exponentially.

They have been listed on Inc. 5000's fastest growing companies the last four years! They have grown from ten employees to seventy-eight full time team members today. They have also expanded from one location in Oneonta to three additional locations in Birmingham, Mobile and Charlotte, North Carolina. SET continues to increase their business with active recruitment of new accounts and is now ProBilling & Funding's largest single point client.

Growth always impacts community. With their growing number of staff members, SET is providing job opportunities and positively affecting the economy. Their team members give of their time and resources to many different school systems by sponsoring teacher and student activities. SET also partners with The Exceptional Foundation, a 501(c) (3) nonprofit organization that serves individuals with special needs in the Greater Birmingham area by targeting social and recreational objectives not met by educational institutions or the community at large.
